Annual General Vestry Meeting - Sunday 11th April at 11.00am

We have been informed by the Honorary Secretaries to General Synod that our Annual General Vestry meeting must take place within the period prescribed by our governing constitution. Our options for making this happen in a satisfactory manner are very limited indeed; either a Zoom meeting which would exclude those who haven't access to the internet, or an in person meeting in church following a church service. I'm sure that all of you will agree that it is best for all that we hold our meeting in the Cathedral with the meeting taking place at 11.00am on Sunday 11th April between the earlier service at 9.45am and the later service at 11.45am.

The meeting itself will only cover those matters that we are required to cover, ie the election of the Select Vestry, adoption of the Parish Accounts and the appointment of Auditors. We would encourage a good attendance at this important meeting as we conduct the necessary business of our church in the midst of an ongoing crisis.

Dear friends

"Are we nearly there yet?"

I wonder how many parents can identify with this question? Often posed in the first few miles of a long journey by a young child with little concept of time and distance, it represents a question which can be put by many of us throughout our lives as we reflect on changing circumstances.

It can be felt by young adults half way through a degree course.

It can be asked by someone buying their first home as they become increasingly frustrated with hurdles and delays in the purchase process.

It can be felt by someone going through a recruitment process for a new job.

It can be experienced by an expectant mother for whom pregnancy has been particularly challenging.

It can even be expressed by someone counting down the days to retirement!

And as we emerge from our current period of lockdown bit by bit, there is a growing sense of *"When will it all end?"* But end it will. You only have to look back over your shoulder and remind yourself how terrible things have been for so many people only a short time ago and how much more positive things are today due to careful management of circumstances and immeasurable sacrifice by so many people.

There is light at the end of this dark tunnel we have all been travelling through.

A light which is getting brighter almost on a daily basis as hospital admissions, new Covid-19 cases and the number of deaths due to the virus continue to go down.

A light which is getting brighter as more and more people are receiving their vaccine and confidence is growing that something resembling what we used to call normality is not that far away.

A light which is getting brighter as some financial analysts predict that our economy could recover to pre-Covid levels as early as the end of this year.

We are not there quite yet, but I would encourage us all to stay focused on those shafts of light around us all which are undeniably getting brighter and brighter if we only have eyes to see it.

And as we continue to travel towards the light, remember that we have not travelled this path alone. We have done so with family and friends. With neighbours and work colleagues. With the loving presence of God's Holy Spirit. Sometimes we only recognise that presence as we look backwards, just like the disciples did as they reflected on the words of their close friend Jesus. Things must have appeared very dark indeed for them as they faced a future without Jesus following his death on the cross. But imagine the shafts of light which broke into their darkness as they heard reports of his resurrection. Imagine the shafts of light

which broke into their darkness as they experienced the risen Jesus for themselves. Imagine the shafts of light which completely dispelled the darkness as they understood that his death on the cross brought life and life in all its fulness. And once that light shone in the darkness it helped them to see that they were never alone on the journey and never would be.

This Easter my prayer is that each of us would know more fully that Jesus is risen, the tomb is empty, death has no sting. My prayer is that this knowledge would help us as we focus on a growing sense of the darkness of Covid-19 coming to an end and the fact that God has been with us throughout these dark and difficult days.

A very happy and Christ-centred Easter to each and every one of you.

Update from Maridi

Maridi has been known for its tropical forest and nearly between eight months of rain fall. And a dry spell which usually starts from December to late February. During the dry spell many citizens around Maridi would be battling with wildfire which takes days to subside. This usually covers miles and miles between two to three days. And it causes immense destruction to crops, huts personal belongings and other basic need such as food, in the garden and in traditional granary stores. Communities have not been given enough fire safety regulation and are often caught unaware when there is fire outbreak.

On 23rd February 2021 wild fire started in five different villages in Maridi in two separate archdeaconries of Cathedral archdeaconry and Amaki archdeaconry in the north of Maridi.

This fire lasted for three days as the fire brigade department in the county has no capacity not even a single equipment that can save communities from wild fire. The fire left destruction in property in five villages. 51 households were affected, 114 homes were destroyed, 18 granary stores were burnt to the ground and lives were lost. In very recent days the fires have affected Maridi town itself with the Diocesan Guest House being burnt to the ground; this guest house has served as a source of income for the Diocese as visitors would have stayed there. Those most affected by the fires are women, children and the elderly.

In response to this situation, the Church in Maridi are providing tarpaulins, round poles or bamboos, bundles of grass and emergency food packs.

To date our Parish have designated over £2,000 in response to the acute needs which have arisen as a consequence of these wildfires.



Some of this family members you see have been left with nothing. This are single mothers. Other family member have visited to pray with them. They are worried about where to begin from as rains are almost coming.

Property Update

Cathedral Hall

Work at the Cathedral Hall continues to progress extremely well following the water damage sustained as a consequence of a burst pipe in January. The transformation in the toilets and foyer is nothing short of remarkable and we continue to be indebted to Bill Forsythe for his tireless work and oversight of this project. Work should be complete by the end of this week if all goes to plan.

Water ingress and damage to stonework in the region of the Baptistry was identified during the Quinquennial Inspection which was carried out a few years ago. Preserving the integrity of our building and making it watertight is a priority for the Select Vestry, on your behalf, as we develop our use of the building for ministry and mission. However the cost of such work can place a heavy burden on the finances of the

Parish. The Select Vestry are always on the look out for ways in which financial assistance with such work can be availed of and are delighted to announce that a grant of £12, 760.00 (50% of the cost of the work exclusive of VAT) has been awarded by the National Churches Trust. We hope to commence this work in May and it is hoped that it will in no way interrupt our normal pattern of services.

Children's Ministry Zoom Specials!

Zoom call with Milo the Gospel Dog

Milo is an extremely talented springer spaniel from Aughnacloy who uses tricks and videos to share the gospel message. We got to watch all his videos, participate in an animal quiz and ask Milo's owners David and Amy, questions about Milo. We also got to meet Grace (their other springer spaniel) who had recently



had a litter of puppies! This was such an enjoyable evening.

Audio/Visual Update and Gift Day

Further to the item in our last magazine regarding a very necessary upgrade of our Audio/Visual system, the Select Vestry are delighted to announce that Rea Sound from Cookstown have been awarded the contract and will hopefully commence work in May, assuming all necessary consents are granted at both Diocesan and Central Church level. Some of the key things which will be upgraded are as follows:

- Installation of 3 cameras;
- Replacement of current sound desk;
- Installation of speakers in Chancel/Sanctuary area;
- New microphones and stands for band;
- New projectors to sharpen/brighten images;
- Installation of video recording capacity;
- Introduction of broadband to enable live feed of services.


The cost of this investment is considerable at just over £40,000.00, but the benefits are much, much greater. This is a major step on the part of the Select Vestry on your behalf and something which we believe will be a blessing to absolutely everyone for many years to come. One way in which you can be part of this blessing is to support the Gift Day which the Select Vestry have specifically set aside in support of this upgrade.

Our Gift is on Sunday 18th April and Bishop David McClay will be our guest preacher at both the 10am and 11.30am service. If you wish to be part of this blessing, you will find a Gift Day envelope in your box of envelopes in the month of April. If you don't have a set of envelopes your offering can be placed in a plain envelope marked "Audio Visual Gift Day", with your name or FWO number on the outside of the envelope to indicate who the gift is from.

As this Gift Day is part of a wider Diocesan Gift Day, 10% of the amount raised will be given to the Diocese to use in the development of church plants and 10% will be given to Maridi Diocese in South Sudan for a specific project yet to be identified.

Please do give this project your full support as we seek to enhance our technology in a sensitive way with a mind to building up the body of Christ in the building and beyond.

"The Lord delights in those who fear him, who put their hope in his unfailing love." (Psalm 147:11)

Ladies, faithful members of Mothers' Union, it is once again time to circulate the Mothers' Union Prayer Leaflet and as your chaplain I have been asked to write a short reflection.

This time last year we were just starting to see the effects of the Coronavirus. There was 'Lockdown', churches closed for corporate worship and an increase in admissions to hospitals. With the latter in mind I must say the members of our Health Service have done an admirable job and deserve our heartfelt thanks.

However one year on I am sure none of us thought that we would still be in a similar position. We have witnessed so many changes, the loss of so many loved ones; things that we thought we would never witness. I have said that our thanks must go to the members of the medical profession but also to the scientists who have successfully formulated a vaccine that many of us have now received. With this there is now *'light at the end of the tunnel.'*

The verse from Psalm 147 that I have quoted above is one of hope. This psalm itself celebrates the amazing providence of God in his care for us after a long night of despair. The greatest symbol of God's faithfulness has come in Jesus Christ. Through the gospel he is tenderly calling us each by name. We are the gathered people of God from the ends of the earth.

Verse 11 above speaks of those who 'fear him (God).' What does it mean? Are we to be afraid of God? No, never. God has created us in his own image. 
Attention all Magazine Distributors
