Dear friends

Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world. James 1: 27

The Epistle of James is what one could best describe as a highly practical letter, challenging readers to carry out works which match the faith they profess. In essence it addresses the "gap" between what we say we believe and what our actions demonstrate we believe.

James was writing to the 12 scattered tribes, scattered as a consequence of the persecution beyond the geographical boundaries of Israel; predominantly Jewish Christians living out their faith in foreign lands. James is commending a way of living to them that, which if lived out in the presence of Gentiles, would be a wonderful witness to the one whom they professed to follow, the Lord Jesus himself.

That "gap" between what is professed and how it is demonstrated it is not something which was unusual. It was something which had plagued the nation of Israel throughout the ages. Some 800 years earlier than James had written his words of challenge, the prophet Isaiah wrote in a similarly challenging fashion;

Woe to those who make unjust laws, to those who issue oppressive decrees, to deprive the poor of their rights and withhold justice from the oppressed of my people, making widows their prey and robbing the fatherless. Isaiah 10: 1-2

Widows were prey to those with riches, power and authority. Orphans were exploited, even robbed by those who should have been caring for and supporting them, according to God's word;

He defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow, and loves the foreigner residing among you, giving them food and clothing. Deuteronomy 10: 18

God's heart is that widows, orphans and those in need should be honoured and blessed rather than looked down upon and exploited.

So lets fast forward now to the early 20th Century when the world experienced the creation of more widows and orphans than was ever conceived possible through man bearing arms against fellow man in the Great War of 1914-1918. The need was huge and was met through a variety of organisations, each with a particular focus and sphere of responsibility. 4 such organisations were brought together through the formation of 1 new group on 15th May 1921, the Royal British Legion.

"Over six million men had served in the war. Of those who came back, 1.75 million had suffered some kind of disability and half of these were permanently disabled.

Then there were those who depended on those who had gone to war – the wives and children, widows, and orphans, as well as the parents who had lost sons in the war, on whom they were often financially dependent.

The Royal British Legion was established to care for those who had suffered as a result of service during the First World War. And we've been helping the Armed Forces community and their families ever since."

I trust from the foregoing that we can easily identify the need within our land. But I also hope that we understand that caring for widows, orphans and those in need is not just a good idea, but God's idea.

The Royal British Legion has served our land superbly well in responding to the needs of veterans and their families over the past 100 years. The majority of the funds needed to extend that care has come through the annual Poppy Appeal, and this year is no exception. Please do support the work of the Royal British Legion as they one more respond to real need and help us to remember those who have fallen in service of their country and indeed those who continue to bear the cruel scars of battle in body, mind and spirit.

We will once more be able to gather at the Cenotaph on Remembrance Sunday for an act of remembrance which will commence at around 10.45am. Our service of Cathedral Praise will be at the earlier time of 9.45am that morning to enable us to participate in this Act of Remembrance. I hope to see you all there.



Belfast Blitz

This year was the 80th anniversary of the Belfast Blitz in which almost 1,000 people died.

One of the victims, Andrew Copling, is buried in our graveyard. Andrew Copling, aged 16, was the son of Ernest Victor and Jane (nee McCloy) Copling of Grahams Yard, Dromore. He was a member of the 70th Battalion (Young Soldiers) Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers.

On 15th April 1941 his Battalion were stationed at Newtownards Airfield. A high explosive bomb landed amongst the Nissen Huts in which they were billeted.

Thirteen members of the Battalion of which Andrew was the youngest, were either killed directly, or died from their injuries over the next few days.

The inscription on his headstone reads:

"Our proudest possessions are memories of your smile"

Wider Act of Remembrance - Sunday 14th November at 6pm

For many of us, Remembrance Sunday can be a challenging day as it not only causes us to call to mind those who have fallen in conflict, but in a wider sense it can remind us of loved ones whose passing has been perhaps less traumatic, but no less difficult for us as we recall. And this year in particular has presented many of us with the additional challenge of not being able to grieve in our accustomed manner through a full church, important conversations over refreshments and the healing which can come through comforting words and warm embraces when words simply fail us.

So we feel that it has never been more important for us to offer a service through which we can acknowledge our wider losses, but in doing so we are in no way taking away from the significance and imperative of remembering the fallen.

So, on the evening of Remembrance Sunday we are going to have a Wider Act of Remembrance at 6pm in the Cathedral for all those who have been bereaved since our last service of remembrance and indeed beyond that.

The service will consist of 2 hymns, a bible reading, a talk, prayers and a symbolic act of remembrance using beautiful white roses. No one will be forced to participate, but our experience has been that a real measure of healing can come through using symbols such as roses as we press into God.

This year, we will have to take additional precautions during our service:

We will have to hand sanitise and wear face coverings when we are on our feet or singing;

We will have to socially distance throughout our service, including the act of remembrance;

We will have to indicate our intention to attend by contacting the church office on 9269 3968 and book our space.

We are really pleased to be able to offer light refreshments this year, immediately following the service.

Please do let us know if you would like to attend as we seek to offer sincere support for those who are grieving in these particularly challenging times.
