#### Dear friends

I wonder how you feel about the Holy Spirit? You may be hungry for more of Him in your life. You may keep him at a distance, treating him like someone whom you don't dislike, but don't want them to get too close to you either. Or you may simply be rather passive about Him, not really that bothered one way or the other.

Jesus promised in his farewell narrative to his closest disciples that he would "ask the Father, and he will give you another Counselor to be with you forever." John 14: 16 That is a wonderful promise from a beautiful saviour, and a promise which was fulfilled so profoundly with the coming of the Holy Spirit at the Feast of Pentecost. The disciples were all together in one place. They had waited patiently and now their patience was rewarded as the Holy Spirit came in power. It is impossible for any of us to properly explain what the Holy Spirit and so it was for Luke as he recorded that there was a sound "like the blowing of a violent wind" and "they saw what seemed to be tongues of fire." Acts 2: 2-3

But rather than trying to paint a picture without paint, in a manner of speaking, Luke spends much more time addressing the effect that the Holy Spirit had in the lives of those assembled that day.

Firstly, there was the new language which the disciples were able to speak. They were able to communicate with God-fearing Jews from every nation under heaven in their own language. We can't communicate with those around us unless we understand their language, or indeed we have someone at hand who does. Changing culture forms part of that "language" and as church we must constantly be asking ourselves are we speaking a language which the world around us can understand. The Holy Spirit is the one who can help us in our endeavours to communicate with a world which believes the church has no voice in the 21st Century.

Secondly, there was a new boldness in the way that the message was proclaimed. It is more than difficult to comprehend the change which is brought about in the heart of Peter following the coming of the Holy Spirit. Jesus predicted that Peter would betray him 3 times before the cock would crow. Peter reacted angrily to such a suggestion. But his anger turned to tears when he realised that Jesus had been quite correct in his prediction and the truth cut to the very core of his being. But after the coming of the Holy Spirit we see a very different Peter. We encounter someone who, in the face of the hostility and cynicism of the crowd, raises his voice and lifts on high the name of Jesus. Peter is no longer fearful, but now proclaims with great courage and boldness the truth of the gospel.

And finally, there is the new heart which is given to the people who are gathered in Jerusalem. These are the people whom we are told are God-fearing Jews from every nation. But they are also the people who are full of cynicism and hostility as they scoffed at Peter stating that the disciples *"have had too much wine to drink." Acts 2: 13.* But the Holy Spirit goes to work in their hearts and we are told that *"Those who accepted his message were baptised, and about three thousand were added to their number that day." Acts 2: 41.* 

Without the Holy Spirit, none of this would have been possible. But with God's Holy Spirit, all things are possible. And the same Holy Spirit is available to us as followers of Christ today. To enable us to speak a language which a watching world understands. To enable us to speak up and speak out with the good news of Christ crucified. To enable hearts to be turned from living for self to living for Jesus.

My prayer is that each of us would embrace more and more of God's Holy Spirit which Jesus promised to those who love Him.

### **Climate Change Committee Update**

The effects of climate change are something which few people in the world would deny is one of the greatest threats to the existence of humanity. Naturalists are amongst the loudest voices advocating for measures to be taken now to address the challenge before it is too late. And the church is awakening to its biblical responsibility of stewarding the creation which our God has so generously entrusted to our care.

Dromore Cathedral, in response to this growing challenge, is active in conceiving of measures which will help us to think in a more climate-friendly way, as well as adopting some different ways of doing things with the net effect of reducing the impact of our actions on the environment.

Amongst these measures are the following:

**The erection of a cycle rack** in the Cathedral Hall car park to enable worshippers to store their bicycle during services/events. This rack will be fixed to the wall of the kitchen to the left hand side looking from the car park (users will be responsible for the security of their bicycles);

A reduction in the number of paper magazines which are produced. We currently produce 450 copies of Cathedral Life for distribution throughout the Parish. If you would rather receive an electronic version of the magazine, then please contact Jill in the Parish Office via email at <u>dromorecathedral@outlook.com</u> or by ringing 9269 3968 and Jill will arrange for you to receive a PDF version of the magazine via email;

A reduction in the number of FWO envelopes which are allocated each year. If you currently support the work of the Parish via the envelope system, why not consider setting up a Standing Order instead? Standing Orders have a number of real benefits. They mean we don't have to find cash to put in an envelope, our support is not dependent on our attendance, they reduce the amount of cash we are handling as church thereby reducing risk and reduces the amount of paper we are using, as well as reducing our expenditure.

Each month, we hope to provide ongoing updates on what we are doing as a church, and what we can each do, to play our part in saving our wonderful world.



### **SOMA Mission**

We are very much looking forward to our weekend of mission from Friday 9th June to Sunday 11th June. We have a team of 4 missioners coming from South Africa, England and Scotland who will be presenting the gospel at each of the events we will be organising. Each of them are members of SOMA, an international organisation committed to the **S**haring **O**f **M**inistries **A**broad.

Mission is something which Jesus calls us all to engage in, something which he presented as an imperative at the end of Matthew's gospel as he sent the disciples out into all the world.

There are a number of things which I would like to say by way of preparation as we think of what lies ahead of us and how we might be part of it.

**Firstly**, we should be approaching this weekend of mission with humility. Someone once described this work as one beggar showing another beggar where to find bread. Jesus modelled what humility looked like so powerfully for us again and again. None of us should be thinking that what we have to offer is any greater or any less than anyone else involved. None of us should be looking down our noses at those who aren't yet Christians but rather caring about people enough to consider inviting them to an event.

**Secondly,** we should be approaching this mission in a collaborative manner. The missioners in our midst will be presenting the gospel at every event. But we, as the body of Christ, can do so many things to assist in preparing for the mission and in the delivery of it. Some of us could offer our homes. At the time of writing we still need accommodation for 2 of the missioners from Thursday to Sunday inclusive. If you think that you could help with that, then please let Geoff know. You could donate some of the scones and tray bakes for the coffee morning. You could help with the BBQ after the children's event on the Saturday afternoon. And finally, and most importantly, you could invite as many people as you know along to each and every event.

I attended a seminar on evangelism recently and one of the things that the speaker emphasised was the importance of inviting rather than bringing. If you commit to bring people to an event and they don't come then you could be left feeling that you have failed in some way. However, once you invite someone you have succeeded, even if they don't attend. An invitation can of course be followed up with the offer of transport as you bring some of those whom you have invited. This is perhaps the most important work we can do as the missioner won't be able to fish unless there are fish in the pond!

And lastly, we should approach this mission prayerfully. All of us can pray, whether we are the most active, mobile of Christians, or housebound through illness or failing mobility. Please do pray for safety for our missioners as they prepare to leave their families and homes to be with us. Please pray for the safety of all our events, that they would be free from incident and would clearly display the love of God. Please pray that we would have the courage to invite our friends, neighbours and family members who aren't yet in Christ. And please pray for ears to be opened and hearts to be softened at each and every gathering.

## The Long Shadow - The Great War And The Twentieth Century by David Reynolds.

In The Long Shadow David Reynolds explores big themes such as democracy, empire, nationalism, capitalism, civilization and remembrance. 
What makes us feel like dancing? In the Bible, 'David danced before the Lord'.


