Dear friends,

In the early hours of 1st July 1916, William (Billy) McFadzean, a Private in the 14th Battalion of the Royal Irish Rifles, assembled in Thiepval Wood along with the rest of his comrades in preparation for an advance on the German trenches in what was to become known as "The Battle of the Somme".

McFadzean was born on 9th October 1895 in Lurgan, but grew up in the Cregagh area of Belfast. Like so many of his peers, at the outbreak of the Great War in 1914, McFadzean enlisted in the British Army, keen to serve his country. He trained at Finner Camp in Ireland and then Seaforth in England before embarking for the Western Front in October 1915. He was what was known as a "Bomber", someone who was trained in handling handheld explosives, hand grenades as we would now know them.

On that morning of the 1st July 1916, the young McFadzean was working his way through the crowded trenches with boxes of explosives, distributing them to his colleagues in preparation for "going over the top", when slipped the out of 2 of the pins grenades. McFadzean threw himself on top of them before they exploded, killing him but injuring only one other soldier. For his action, he was posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross, the highest award for valour that could be bestowed on a soldier of the British Empire. The citation, published in the London Gazette read as follows:

"No. 14/18278 Pte. William Frederick McFadzean, late R. Ir. Rif. For most conspicuous bravery. While in a concentration trench and opening a box of bombs for distribution prior to an attack, the box slipped down into the trench, which was crowded with men, and two of the safety pins fell out. Private McFadzean, instantly realising the danger to his comrades, with heroic courage threw himself on the top of the Bombs. The bombs exploded blowing him to pieces, but only one other man was injured. He well knew his danger, being himself a bomber, but without a moment's hesitation he gave his life for his comrades."

McFadzean didn't consider whether he knew anyone in the trench before taking action. He didn't consider whether they were protestant or roman catholic before launching himself on top of the grenades. He didn't ask himself if there might be some benefit for himself before throwing himself on top of the 2 grenades, indeed he knew only too well that in doing so it would have fatal consequences for him.

Whenever someone chooses a particular course of action, in service of others, in the full knowledge that it may well have fatal consequences for them, then that is what sacrifice looks like.

This Remembrance Sunday, like every other one since remembering became a corporate, national event, people will gather at war memorials the length and breadth of our country. Names of the fallen will be read, silence will be kept and tributes will be paid to men and women who have laid down their lives in service of their country and indeed each of us in wars and conflicts in lands that we may never even have heard of or visited. For most of us, the names will mean nothing. They most likely aren't related to us or even known to us. However, not knowing someone doesn't mean that we shouldn't thank God for them and their sacrifice.

So let us make a huge effort this Remembrance Sunday, to stand together as we remember the fallen, those who grieve their loss most acutely and indeed those who bear the scars of conflict, whether in body, mind or spirit.

May God bless us all as we remember once more. Geoff

Property Update

I'm sure that most of us will have noticed the huge difference which the external re-painting of the Rectory has made. It had been some time since it had been painted last and the windows were beginning to look very tired, along with the rest of the masonry.

And following the purchase of 32 Church Street earlier this year, you may recall that we had indicated that the front of the building would be "freshened up" with a coat of paint. This has now happened and has made a massive difference to the overall impression of Church Street.

Finally, worrying levels of damp have been discovered in the back hall area of the Rectory. Quotations are still being sought to complete the work of installing a damp proof course in this area of the Rectory along with replastering and redecoration of the same area.

New Pew Cushions

Some of you may recall that during Covid we were required to remove all soft furnishings from the Cathedral to reduce the risk of passing on the virus to fellow worshippers. It was always our intention to return these to the pews when we were permitted to do so. However, when we endeavoured to do so, we encountered 2 very real problems, namely the old seat furnishings did not meet fire safety standards and most of them were quite literally falling apart at the seams. The Select Vestry have now approved the purchase of new seat cushions and hope to have them in place by Christmas of this year. Each pew will cost around £90 to provide a cushion for, which when you consider the number of pews in the Cathedral, will soon add up to a considerable bill. If you would be interested in donating to this project, then you can place your gift in a plain envelope with your name and FWO number on the outside of the envelope. Gifts can be placed on the offering plate or left with Jill in the Church Office.

Service of Installation

The Cathedral Choir



Wider Act of Remembrance - Sunday 12th November at 6pm

Remembrance Sunday can be a particularly difficult day for many of us as we call to mind those loved ones who are no longer with us. As has been our custom in more recent years, as a Church, we are providing a space for us to remember those who have passed on since last year, or indeed beyond, through our wider act of remembrance on the evening of Remembrance Sunday at 6pm in the Cathedral.

The service will consist of 2 hymns, a bible reading, a talk, prayers and a symbolic act of remembrance using a white rose. No one will feel obliged to participate, but our experience has been that a real measure of healing can come for those who do, as together we press a little further into God's grace.

Light refreshments will be served immediately following the service.


