Then, because so many people were coming and going that they did not even have a chance to eat, he said to them, "Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest." Mark 6:31

I'm sure that you've heard the saying "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy." This isn't suggesting that our level of intelligence is affected by the amount of work we do or don't. Rather, this conventional wisdom is suggesting to us that too much work without rest brings us to a point where we lose something of our usual lustre or sparkle.

Jesus recognizes in the above verse that the disciples were in need of some rest. They've been sent out to preach, teach and heal, no mean feat when you consider that this would have been the first time for the disciples to exercise this type of ministry on their own. They return to Jesus with stories of how God was at work. So many people were coming and going that they didn't even have a chance to eat. Imagine that, busyness to the point that there isn't any room for taking time to eat. Has that ever been your experience? Have you ever reached the end of the day and thought to yourself that you hadn't even stopped to eat, hadn't even thought of food, such was the level of your busyness? I'm sure that as Jesus listened intently to their chattering about lives transformed and brokenness restored that recognized their own need to be transformed and restored. So he suggests that they take themselves away to a quiet place to get some rest, to experience a different rhythm without the pressure or stresses of their busy lives.

We see this model of periods of extreme intensity being punctuated with rest in Jesus' own ministry. How many times do we read in the Bible that people were looking for Jesus but couldn't find him because he had taken himself away to a solitary place for rest and refreshment. Likewise if we take time and care to "read around" these occasions we find that again and again there were people asking, even demanding, "where were you, we needed you and couldn't find you?" Can you imagine how much pressure this must have felt like for Jesus to hear these accusing questions? Can you imagine how easily he could have slipped into going to a solitary place less frequently to avoid these negative comments and hear nothing but praise instead? And can you also imagine how quickly burn out could become the experience of someone who is constantly available, constantly on the go, constantly at the beck and call of every single person?

Jesus' model for a work/life balance isn't just good advice, it is absolutely essential for each and every one of us who want to finish the race set before us just as vigorously and passionately as we commenced it. Rest is such an important part of ensuring we are in the best place to serve others when the need arises. Yet rest can often be viewed in a negative manner and misunderstood as laziness. How many times will you hear people comment on the value of someone else being measured in their output.

Jesus values great workers as well, not just in the sense of the quantity but rather the fruitfulness of their work. That's why I'm utterly convinced he encouraged his "great workers" to come with him to a quiet place and get some rest in order that when their spiritual batteries were adequately recharged they would be even more fruitful as they re-engaged in ministry.

What are you like what it comes to taking rest? It isn't the easiest thing for many of us because of it might be misunderstood by others, but it is essential for each of us. That's why our organisations take a break over the summer months in order that our leaders and volunteers can take a rest and come back in September and be even more fruitful.

For me, getting a rest means taking off my socks and shoes and getting the sand from a beach between my toes, hearing the sound of the ocean as it ebbs and flows around my feet. For you it may well be quite different. But one thing remains the same for all of us, rest is a very necessary part of us being fruitful workers.

Whatever you do this summer, make time for rest and come back in September refreshed and restored. Geoff

#### **Property Update**

Aside from the ongoing general maintenance there are 2 rather significant projects which we are preparing for in the next few months...

**First**, some of you may have noticed that the condition of the plaster to the right of the memorial window (around the Legion standard) is becoming increasingly cracked with dust grit becoming more prevalent in the seats below. This will need to be addressed over the next few months, with the wall being picked and re-plastered. This may well necessitate closing off the seating around the affected area for the duration of the work.

**Second**, following receipt of the Quinquennial Report, it has become apparent to the Select Vestry that the whole of the Cathedral building will need to be rewired as a matter of urgency. We are currently at the stage of seeking advice from consultants in conjunction with a firm of conservation architects and will advise on cost and timings when we have more information. The Select Vestry are also of the view that when the rewiring is being carried out that this will present an ideal opportunity to install more cost effective and appropriate lighting to better illuminate our beautiful cathedral. More details to follow as soon as we have them.

#### **Summer Epilogue Services**

It has been our custom over the summer months in recent years to have an Epilogue Service at 8pm. However, due to the fact that there is not currently a curate on staff, the Rector has decided that there will be no summer Epilogue services this year. In arriving at this decision the Rector has considered his own capacity to continue with 4 services each Sunday throughout the summer and also the practice of many churches in the surrounding area to adopt a more gentle rhythm when it comes to service patterns in order that an element of rest can be experienced in the midst of ministry.



"Power corrupts; absolute power corrupts absolutely." This quotation is credited to Lord Acton, 19th century politician, historian and moralist (a latter-day influencer) and suggests that the more power someone has, the more their moral sensibilities diminish.


Have I become obsessed with the letter P as both April and May's offerings (Purpose and Peace ) began with that letter? Possibly! But sure there was no better way to complete the series than to give you, 'another P please Bob' (Do you remember Blockbusters?). Logically, the subject of power; who has it and what you can do with it, seemed to follow on.

Since the beginning of written records, rulers have exercised their power and status over the rest of us. Leaders are needed to organise and establish communities, uphold laws and standards and bringing order to chaos. The pattern for this is clearly seen in the Old Testament under Moses. Other ancient civilisations are available and grouped in similar ways. However, from Roman Emperors; who declared themselves gods, to Napoleon; who declared himself an emperor, to more power-hungry maniacs; who pertain to Messianic status, making everything great again, we have a history of being ruled by people who think they know better than God.


#### Cathedral Office Opening Hours - July
