Meet our new Sunday placement student, Mark Trimble. Mark will be joining us for 10 weeks from Sunday 5th October.

Hi everyone, my name is Mark, I am 38 years old, married to Emma and have a little boy called Toby.

We recently joined Willowfield Parish church where my wife now works as a kid's worker. Prior to that we were in Drumbeg Parish where I served as a Diocesan lay reader and part time Evangelist.

The rest of the time, I work as a Chartered Accountant in finance.

I have served in church in multiple ways over the years and have a real passion to see people come to faith. I am keen to see discipleship grow within the church so people can live out their faith in their daily lives.

In my spare time, I love to spend time with my family or friends, play football, play the drums or go up the mountains.

Looking forward to getting to know you all, serve and learn during my time in Dromore .

One thing which really irritates me is when you do something for someone and they don't even take the time to thank you for it. How many of us have found ourselves in the situation where we are stuck in traffic and someone is attempting to join the traffic from a side road. You indicate to them that you are willing to let them join the queue in front of you, an invitation which they are keen to accept but don't acknowledge with as much as a wave of their hand. Very frustrating!

Another favourite one of mine is when I've been paying for something in a shop and you give the cashier payment and there isn't as much as a please or a thank you. I don't want to turn into Victor Meldrew from "One Foot in the Grave" but it is just common courtesy and doesn't cost a thing to take the time to say thank you.

Isn't it something we teach our children and grandchildren and something which our parents and grandparents instilled in us? How many times have I heard myself saying "Now don't forget to say thank you."

The quote at the beginning of this article is at the heart of a very well known passage from Luke's Gospel in which Jesus takes pity on 10 lepers who cry out to him for mercy. Jesus simply directed them to go and show themselves to the priest and as they went, they were cleansed, just like that. But only one returned to say thank you, and he was a Samaritan. His words and actions demonstrated the depth of his thankfulness. He was praising God in a loud voice, threw himself at the feet of Jesus and thanked him. We could focus on the fact that he was a "foreigner" but that isn't the focus of my reflection as we approach harvest. My focus in this short note is that he was the only one who took the time to say thank you. But why did he say thank you? Well, quite simply, he understood just how much Jesus had done for him and what a debt of gratitude he owed Him. His life was transformed from being in isolation with other lepers with no hope to being restored to his family and community. He had so much to be thankful for and he made a point of doing so in spite of the fact that his peers didn't take as much as one second to say thank you.

This harvest, I would encourage you to sit down and write a list of all of the good things in your life. Your home, your family, your neighbours, the food you eat, the clothes you wear, the town we inhabit, the jobs we have or were employed in, the climate we enjoy, the freedom in our land, the education system, the health care....the list could go on. When we take the time to count our blessings, it might encourage us to return to Jesus, just like the Samaritan leper, and with a loud voice throw ourselves at his feet praising God with words of gratitude......

.....and thanks. It only takes a second!

But why not take more than a second this harvest and join us for worship when we corporately pour out our hearts in thanksgiving as we lay ourselves at the feet of Jesus, in a manner of speaking, and utter words of praise for what He has done and thanks for all that He given us.

Please don't be like the 9 lepers who forgot what Jesus had done for them this harvest. Consider the response of the Samaritan leper who demonstrated very clearly just how grateful he was.

One of the things which we have learnt in relation to the decoration of the Church for Harvest is that perhaps less is more. Mrs Sara McCorkell will coordinate a group of volunteers who will attend to the decoration of all of those areas which will be decorated on Friday 17th from 10am and Saturday morning.

## Non-perishable items and how they can bless others at Harvest

This Harvest time, why not consider bringing a non-perishable item such as a packet of pasta or a packet of tea bags to Church? This might be a lovely thing for both young, and not so young, to engage in and provide us with an opportunity to have conversations about what is behind this act of kindness and how it might bless others. All non-perishable items can be brought to the front of Church either during the service on Harvest morning, or as people arrive, and will be delivered to Via Wings for distribution to those with particular needs at the moment.

## **Harvest Appeal 2025**

Each harvest for the past 40 years or so, there has been an appeal envelope enclosed with either the box of envelopes or with your church magazine through which contributors have been able to give. As far as I am aware, each year this source of income has been essential to ensure that the mission and ministry of the parish has been enabled with the funds being designated by successive Select Vestries to the General Account.

This year, with the essential work of rewiring the cathedral about to commence and the fundraising target set at £95,000, the Select Vestry have decided that the Harvest Appeal will go towards the Development Fund, from which the rewiring will be financed.

Giving at harvest through the harvest envelopes has ebbed and flowed over the years with a peak of £12,915 in 2001. The equivalent value of this amount in today's world is £24,457 according to the Bank of England's inflation calculator. In 2024, the total figure contributed through harvest envelopes was £8,341. This means that support for the harvest appeal has reduced by around 66% in the past 24 years when we make allowances for inflation. Of course there could be a number of factors which have contributed to this reduction, not least a reduction in those attending our parish on a regular basis. However I would like to ask everyone to prayerfully and carefully consider their level of support for the rewiring project this harvest time.

There may be some of us who have not reviewed or revised our level of giving for some years, in spite of increases in income over the corresponding years. Perhaps now is the time to do so as we consider all the good things which the Lord has placed in our hands and say thank you with an increased measure of our income.

On the other hand, there may be some of us for whom living costs have increased, putting more pressure on already tight budgets. If that is your situation, then you may have to consider a reduction in your offering this year.

Mine is not to make demands, but rather to invite each of us to examine our hearts, hold this whole process in prayer, consider God's goodness and faithfulness and reflect our thankfulness with our level of giving.

## **Rewiring Undate**

At the time of writing the Select Vestry are very close to having tender documents in hand which would mean that we could begin the tender process around the middle of October, God willing.

## **Dromore Cathedral History Reading Group**

The History Reading Group will hold their next meeting on-

#### Wednesday 29th October 2025 at 7.30 PM. Venue - The Clayton Memorial Hall.

In picking a title to read in advance of the October meeting the group had something of a hard act to follow. The book which was read over the summer just past, and discussed at the August meeting, was much enjoyed and very well received.

1599 A Year In The Life Of William Shakespeare by James Shapiro is a book that is well researched, well written and simply very clever in its concept. In brief summary the book highlights how the Shakespeare history plays of 1599, Henry V and Julius Caesar, are heavily infused with subtle references to the politics of late Elizabethan England - conflict in Ireland, the reformation, and the potential for a second Spanish Armada , known as the "Invisible Armada". There is much more to Shakespeare than might meet the eye!

So impressed were the group that they plan to read the follow up book by the same author during 2026 - **1606 Shakespeare And The Year Of Lear.** 

In selecting a title for discussion at the October 2025 meeting the group hit the fast forward button on the history machine and moved to Spain in the time period 1936 - 1939. The book currently being read is -

#### The Spanish Civil War - Reaction, Revolution and Revenge by Paul Preston.

The book provides an overview of the conflict between the left leaning republican government in Spain and right wing nationalist rebels led by General Francisco Franco.

Everyone is most welcome to attend to share some fellowship and to engage in some lively discussion about the Spanish Civil War.

Each of the two full days trailing, tracking and traversing rocky terrain ended with a lovely meal, good company and a soft bed in our hotel.







## **Kingdom Kids Bible Buddies**

On Sunday 7th September, twenty-five children adopted a Bible Buddy. The Bible Buddies were sent home as a way of encouraging children to develop a daily habit of reading their Bible and prayer. This initiative has proved very successful! One child has read her whole bible (all three hundred plus pages!) in one week! Be encouraged through some of the children and parents updates on their Bible Buddies:

"Harriett has loved looking after her Prayer Bear "Thea" It has given Harriett a real interest in reading the Bible. The verses that were sent home have all been short little snippets, perfect for bedtime, but also great little cues for reading a bit more each night and a good template for continuing after the list of verses is complete. Thea has been to school with Harriett numerous times over the last few weeks and is being very well looked after."

"Lucie is really loving her prayer buddy Panda whom she named Grace. She began with the two week plan of Bible verses and is now beginning to read the book of John. She even took it to her Granny's when she had a recent sleepover. It has really helped her develop her relationship with God."

"I think this is a great way to introduce and get kids to read a Bible. Carter loves finding the verse himself and reading to us and it is now part of our bedtime routine. We have just started with one to two verses every night and then it can grow as he does."

"She is loving Bible Buddy we have only missed two nights of it so she is doing so well at it."

"Me and my panda Bamboozle are getting on very well. I've been feeding it every night by reading from my Bible."

"I feed my panda Tea Leaf every night with prayers."

"I call my Bible Buddy Oreo and before I go to bed each night I feed him by reading a Bible verse to him."
