

"I don't care how much you know....."

I remember very clearly the first time I went on a trip to Africa being asked by someone upon my return why I didn't just give the money it took to get me there to the people in need whom I was visiting. It is a good question, one which I have no doubt has been asked by many people before it was put to me. There are a number of ways in which to answer such a question, perhaps none to the satisfaction of the one posing the question. But the answer which helps me most was given by many of the people I encountered on that trip. They were utterly convinced that God loved them because why would someone from а comfortable existence in the UK leave their home and their family to travel all the way to Africa if that were not the case? There were no benefits for me to travel to Africa. I wouldn't progress in my work as a consequence. It would be a costly trip in terms of my personal financial contribution but also in terms of separation from friends, family and my home comforts. The folks we were visiting didn't need to be told any of the foregoing, they worked it out for themselves that there was sacrifice involved in making that journey. For them, that sacrifice demonstrated something very powerful; it communicated that God cared for them and that He had sent his ambassadors from the UK to communicate that love and concern in a way which words could never do.

One of the key texts which we focus on in the fast approaching season of Christmas is John 1: 1-14. Known as the prologue, it represents a deeply theological text which speaks of the love of God from the beginning

of time. But speaking of love and showing love are two quite different things. I recall once hearing someone say that they didn't care how much I knew until they knew how much I cared. In essence what they were saying was that they didn't care how well I had been trained in preaching. They didn't care how gifted a church leader I was. They didn't care how well I could explain the development of the church down through the ages. What really mattered to them was how much I cared. Once people know how much we care it earns us, in a sense, the right "to be heard".

Through the incarnation, the Father not only spoke of his love, but demonstrated it profoundly by sending his one and only Son to be like one of us. John puts it this way in his prologue; "The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us." John 1: 14a

By becoming one of us, Jesus showed that he cared about the hungry, for he knew what it was to hunger. Jesus showed that he cared about those who grieve, for he wept over the death of his friend Lazarus. Jesus showed that he cared for those who were caused to flee their homes and communities, for he became a refugee in Egypt to thwart the evil intentions of Herod. Jesus showed that he cared for family, for he entrusted his mother to the care of his friend John. Jesus showed that he cared for those who were unloved, for he reached out again and again with words of love and forgiveness, even to a thief on a cross.

That, friends, is the heart of the Christmas message. Love came down that first Christmas in a way that no one had ever really experienced before. And love continues to come down when we love as he loves us. There will be many opportunities for each of us to demonstrate that love, both in church life and in our families, places of work and communities. Perhaps you could be part of the group who will travel around the town on the evening of Tuesday 16th December singing carols to those who perhaps are no longer able to leave their homes. Perhaps you could volunteer for one hour on Friday 12th December when we have a sit out to raise much needed funds for the work of the Southern Area Hospice.

The heart of the Christmas message is that love took on flesh. Let your love for God be shown clearly this Christmas as you show how much you care.







RE-WIRING OF CATHEDRAL

At time of writing this note, we still haven't appointed a contractor to carry out the essential work of re-wiring our historic Cathedral, though the Select Vestry would be of the mind to commence this work as early in the New Year as possible. During the works, services will take place in the Cathedral Hall for at least a 12 week period with one service taking place at 10.45am each Sunday. Please see this as an opportunity for us to worship together more regularly rather than a reason to stay at home. I would ask everyone to be particularly understanding and gracious during this period of disruption for all of us. Our service schedule on page 11 reflects our normal rhythm of worship. Please note that there will be no evening Epilogue Service during January or February.

PRAISE, PRAYER & TESTIMONY

Praise, Prayer & Testimony will take place on the Sunday 7th December in the Cathedral with Peter Branker sharing something of his experiences in Zanzibar following his recent trip. Peter has visited Zanzibar on a number of occasions and intends to spend an extended period there in 2026.

And Melanie Bond will be sharing something of her faith journey on the evening of Sunday 11th January 2026, either in the Cathedral or the Cathedral Hall, depending on whether the rewiring works will have commenced at that time. Melanie has a ladies boutique in Bridge St, Dromore and is a member of the Flim Church here in the town.

REAL CHANGE - becoming more like Jesus in everyday life

Some exciting news! In the first part of 2026, on Sunday evenings (see dates below), we are planning on going through Real Change, a six-session course that helps churches and Christian groups pursue biblical, gospel-centred, heart-focused change.

Based on CCEF's (Christian Counselling and Educational Foundation) Dynamics of Biblical Change, Real Change is ideal for anyone who wants to grow to be more like Jesus. It is a course for anyone who wants to find out how the gospel changes us from the inside out – for anyone who wants to take a look at what is going on in their heart and grow with God's help to see real change.

Introduction: In Real Change we will learn more about how God changes us. It is an opportunity to grow in faith, in love, and in hope. Whether we are new Christians or mature, we all have areas of our lives which need transforming. All of us have hearts that go astray; all of us face troubles that weigh on us. But Christ meets us where we are, in the places where we struggle. Some of us tend towards anger or impatience, others towards jealousy or discontent. Some of us struggle with addictions and, in different ways, all of us still harbour pride in our hearts. God is not planning on leaving us this way!

God promises to work patiently with us in the midst of our waywardness and our woes. Faith meets God in the very place of honest struggle with sin and affliction. His mercy and grace change us in ways that are truly beautiful and joyous. We can trust the words of Phil 1:6 "I am sure of this, that He who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ." God is going to bring to completion the good work He has already begun in us. But how does this process of change work?

Each week the Bible Study, reflection, and discussion in Real Change will help us understand how God works with us. We will reflect on our own hearts. We will reflect on life's hardships. We will reflect on God's mercies. And we will come to better understand how our Saviour meets us in our particular life situation. (Any group reflection will be in pairs, the same pair each week)

Real change is not a self-improvement project that we do entirely on our own. We grow nearer to God by His direct working and by the encouragement and prayers of other people.
